Guidance for Crafting Grading Rubrics

Common Rubric Design Tips

- How many performance levels should be included?
 - Typically, 3-5 levels are sufficient. Ensure distinct differences between each level. More levels
 can create finer distinctions but may also reduce clarity.
- What terms should be used for performance levels?
 - o For lower levels, use terms like "does not meet requirements" instead of "poor" or "failing."
 - Mid-range levels might be "meets most requirements" or "satisfactory."
 - o Top levels could be "excellent" or "exceeds expectations."
- How are points assigned to each level? Align point values with your grading standards. Assign a total
 possible score, then distribute points across criteria based on their importance, placing point values
 with performance descriptions for clarity.
- Can rubrics include flexibility? Yes, allow a range of points for each level to introduce some flexibility.
- How to write clear performance descriptions? Describe the highest level first, then the lowest level, and fill in the middle levels, adjusting the descriptors to reflect varying degrees of performance.
- Should descriptions be numerical or descriptive? Use numbers for quantifiable criteria and descriptive language for qualitative criteria. A mix of both is often effective.
- How to test a rubric's effectiveness? Grade assignments by comparing them to the highest performance description first, then proceed to lower levels if necessary.
- Is it possible to use rubrics for online grading? Digital platforms like Blackboard and Turnitin support rubric creation and grading online, with seamless integration into their grading systems.
